

As an Audio Matrix Processor, MATRIX A6 is easy to be used and operated and can offer state-of-the-art signal processing in a cost effective package.

Also as digital audio platform for professional use, Matrix A6 can be used in following electromagnetic environment: residential, commercial and light industrial, urban outdoors. It is the apparatus intended for rack mounting.

Features

1. 14 x 14 Digital Matrix

Projects using DSP platforms usually require a minimum number of inputs and outputs. This determines the choice of dedicated matrix models. MATRIX A6 offers a large choice of I/O options in order to cover most of applications:


I/O:

- 6 analogue IN / 6 analogue OUT on rear panel ports
- 8 digital IN / 8 digital OUT via DANTE32S optional card

The basic system features 6 IN x 6 OUT. With the DANTE32S option, it offers 14 IN x 14 OUT. I/O expansion is possible with 16 pcs devices linked together for a maximum of 96 x IN and 96 x OUT.

2. DSP functions

MATRIX A6 is intended for non-experts. The system uses fixed architecture for quick and easy operation. The intuitive GUI utilizes a familiar hardware-like layout to enable a short programming timeline and rapid hardware implementation.



All functionalities can be configured with the PC Editor Software. Settings can be memorized for easy duplication or modification.

Features

3. Networks

MATRIX A6 uses four types of network connections:

• CP/IP for LAN control

• RD Ports are dedicated to connect the Remote Control Device of Matrix system such as RVC-2000, RPM-600 and power these devices. There are total 4 ports like this built on the host (MATRIX A6) and used to connect with the remote devices. If much more remote devices need to be connected, It is necessary to expand these ports by multiple hosts (MATRIX A6) linked.

• DANTE32S for multi-channel digital audio transport.


Cable connections for Remote Controllers (RD ports)

Use shielded CAT 5e (or better) cable to connect the remote controllers to the RD ports. The maximum transmission distance is 200 meters.


Don't connect a RD Port to the router, or this can damage your devices.

Hooking graphic illustrates:






Front Panel Description



1. LCD Display

It displays device information, such as device name, firmware version, ID or communication states.



a). Device name

b). Current preset

c). Current firmware version released.

d). Current ID, The ID can be obtained automatically when the device is connected correctly.

e). The connection indicator between PC and device. When the connection is normal, both icons in the box will flash alternately.

f). DSP connection indicator. In case of problem inside unit, "DSP!" icon will appear.

g).Optional DANTE32S card indicator. The "DANTE32S" icon will apear once the card is available in the rear slot.

Remark: The full-lighting screen's brightness will go down by about 10% if none any button operation /Paging activation/GPIO activation/GPIO activition/PC software connection applied on the host or other linked devices during 30 seconds.

2. Analog

Analog input indicator. The green lighting indicates the presence of signal. When the input signal clips. The red will light.

3. Analog

Analog output indicator. The green lighting indicates the presence of signal. When the output signal clips. the red will light.

4. Status

• FAULT

The red LED indicates the presence of DSP fault, The "DSP !" icon will appear on the LCD display simultaneously.

• COMM

The green LED indicates the normal communication between PC and your device. The green will flash if the Data is being transmitted.

• PWR


The blue LED indicates th unit is powered.

5. Rotary potentiometer

Press it to access the menu, Then rotate it left or right to select the submenu, Finally press it to enter the related function option and set it.

Rear Panel Description

1. Power socket

The power socket must be used with a quality cord. In case of failure the cord must be replaced. Do not try to fix it. The supply voltage is between 100V and 240 VAC, 50-60 Hz, depending on different countrires or regions.

The socket includes the fuse compartment. When changing it. make sure to replace it with a model of the same characteristics.

2. Optional Module Compartment

This location is reserved for the optional DANTE32S card. However, It can be used by other expansion modules.

3. RD port

It can be used to connect with remote controller such as RPM-600, RVC-2000.

4. LAN network

The port is used for the Ethernet connection. One of two LED indicators included in the port will light once plugged, the green one indicating the good connection to the network and the yellow one indicating the good data transmission.

• If the yellow lights off, there is a transmission problem; If on, with Green LED off, the device has detected the network, but none connection.

• That the Green lights on means the network connection is correct.

5. RS232

The port is used to control the parameters of MATRIX A6 remotely. For example to change preset value or gain value of one channel. Details as the list of control commands in appendix.

6. CTRL IN

According to different PC software, The one of 4 corresponding ports to "CTRL IN" will be grounded to trigger. (Details as system configuration interface)

7. Control output

Once one port is grounded to trigger, it will output signals. Usually we use it as the switch of third-party equipment.

8. Output

6 PCS of balanced analog outputs included in Euroblock connector.

9. Input

6 PCS of balanced analog inputs included in Euroblock connector.



5.4. Configuration interface of DSP input channel

1). Refresh: Refresh the device list.

2). EXP/Gate: An Expander is used to add dynamic to a signal. When the signal is below a certain threshold the expander boosts the input signal with a determined ratio. When the signal is beyond the threshold, the output signal remains identical to the input signal. By adjusting the value of the ratio to its maximum, the Expander is transformed into a Noise Gate. **Threshold:** -80dB to +20dB

Ratio: Gain ratio between the input signal and the amplified signal, from 1:1 to 10:1. **Attack:** Reaction time when the signal is below the specified threshold, from 0 to 250ms **Release:** Reaction time of the Expander when the signal passes beyond the specified threshold from 5ms to 2000ms.

Bypass: Press this button, the function of this area is invalid. **Default:** Restore this area to default settings.

3). DC48V: 48V phantom power for electric microphone. Note that this button is only used for external condenser microphone, otherwise it may damage your device.

4). Polarity: inverts the phase of the signal by 180°.

5). Microphone Sensitivity: Input sensitivity for a microphone, from -48dB to 0dB.

The equalizer is used to compensate or alter the spectral characteristics of the signal in order to obtain the flattest possible frequency response. The module here is a parametric 5 bands EQ. **Freq:** central frequency of the filter between 20Hz and 20kHz.

Fact: selectivity of the filter(Q). Greater is the value, thinner is the processed part of the spectrum. Can be adjusted from 0.30 to 30.

Gain: Gain or attenuation of the center frequency, from-15dB to +15dB.

Type: Filter type, Peak/Low/High.

Bypass1~5: temporarily cancels the individual processing of filters 1~5 without having to use the general 'Bypass'.

7). EQ: High Pass Filter: Those filters are used to eliminate non necessary frequencies above and below the signal spectrum, in order to avoid any background noise generation due to multi-processing. For instance, a voice microphone will be set to 100HZ. **Freq:** Cut-off frequency.

Type: Filter type (total optional 21 types).

8). EQ: Low Pass Filter: Those filters are used to eliminate non necessary frequencies above and below the signal spectrum, in order to avoid any background noise generation due to multi-processing. For instance, a voice microphone will be set to 4kHz for the low Pass. **Freq:** Cut-off frequency.

Type: Filter type (total optional 21 types).

Note: The pass filter can be set manually by enter alpha or numeric values, or directly clicking on the frequency-response graph, keeping moving the mouse symbol while holding down the button to make it real.

9). Bypass: the signal is not processed and skips to the next processing module.

10). Flat: all parameters are reset to the factory settings.

11). LINK: After it enables, based on current channel to link with the other channel. Finally related functionalities of both channels will be linked together such as fader, phase, mute, delay and so on.

12). COMP: a compressor can limit the dynamics of a signal beyond a certain level. When the signal exceeds the Threshold it is compressed in a ratio greater than 1. Below the Threshold, input and output signals remain the same. By adjusting the ratio to its maximum value, the compressor is transformed into a limiter.

Threshold: threshold from which the signal is compressed, from -30dB to+20dB

Ratio: Compression ratio. For instance, a 4:1 ratio means that the input level is 4dB above the threshold, the output signal will be 1dB above this threshold. The ratio value can be set from 10:1 to 1:1.

Attack: Reaction time of the compressor when the signal is beyond the specified threshold. From 10 to 250ms.

Release: reaction time of the Compressor when the signal is below the specified threshold, from 5ms to 2000ms.

Bypass: Press this button, this area function is invalid.

Default: Restore COMP parameters to default.

13). Delay: 1361.2916ms as the maximum delay time can be set to each channel. It can be used on the simultaneous application of audio/vedio or phase adjustment.Bypass: The signal is not processed and skips to the next processing module.

14). Input channel 1-6 adjustment: To adjust the gain value, mute or custom channel name applied on corresponding channel.

15). Output channel 1-6 adjustment: To adjust the gain value, mute or custom channel name applied on corresponding channel.

16). Load from Device: Loading related information from device and to be used for sync device settings.

17). Sync meter: Click it to achieve synchronization under the DANTE32S mode.



5.5. Configuration interface of DSP output channel

Note: Except "Expander/Gate" part, the same menu as DSP input channel's applied. The EQ parameters here is equipped with 8 bands, Details as introduction of DSP input channel.

This part of the software is used to route inputs through a graphical representation as a matrix. By clicking on the gray boxes several inputs can be assigned to several outputs. If the connection is active the box turns green, otherwise it remains gray.

The matrix can route 14 input signals to 14 separate outputs. One talks about a 14×14matrix.

IN(OUT)01 to IN(OUT)06 are analog I/O available on the rear panel.

D-01 to D-08 are DANTE32S digital I/O. They are selectable when using the optional DANTE32S card only.

The principle of the Ducker is to attenuate one or several channels when priority signals are activated. The main applications are automatic speech for conference or priority messages. E.g.Use the host microphone signal to control the background music volume. The host automatically reduces the background music volume when speaking. After the speech, the volume is automatically restored.

1). Ducker Input Priority Setting

Each input corresponds to each output. This area is used to set the priority of input audio 0-15.

2). Ducker Parameter Setting

Threshold: threshold of attenuation. From 0dB to-60dB.

Depth: depth of attenuation.

Active Time: Velocity of gain change to attenuate inputs.

Bypass: Transition time between the attenuated level and return to the normal level.

5.8. ANC/AGC configuration interface



ANC: Proceeding auto elemination of noise. It can be used to eleminate it once the background noise happen in use.

AGC: Proceeding auto control of gain. It can be used to control the gain based on the four point curve value as above images. Once the HF/LF frequency value isn't inconstant with the set value it will be increased or compressed into the limits automatically.

1). Input: Here 6 input channels can be selected (CH1~CH6), Grey box means closed channel and green box means the channel opened.

2) ANC OFF: The box lights green when it is enable to control the noise automatically.AGC OFF: The box lights green when it is enable to control the gain automatically.AGC Default: It will control the gain automatically based on the default preset parameters.

3). Output: Here 6 output channels can be selected (CH1~CH6), Grey box means closed channel and green box means the channel opened.

4). ANC+AGC Module A/B/C

Attack: Reaction time when the signal is below the specified threshold, from 0 to 250ms. **Release:** Reaction time of the Expander when the signal passes beyond the specified threshold from 5ms to 2000ms.

X1/2/3/4: Used to proceed gain adjustment based on -85dB~20dB of gain range.

Y1/2/3/4: Used to proceed gain adjustment based on -100dB~20dB of gain range.

Remark: The filter can be set by key-in figures directly or adjusting the 4 frequences in graphics.

5.9. FBC configuration interface



FBC(Feedback Canceller) is a function which eliminates feedback automatically.

Feedback occurs unexpectedly in a system where there are microphones and speakers nearby one of the other.

This loop effect is an electro-acoustic resonance which generates an unpleasant frequency noise. The FBC automatically detects the frequencies involved and attenuates them almost instantly using a series of selective filters.

1). FBC Sensitivity: The sensitivity range adjusted from -50 dB to -70 dB; To select the slow release speed or fast under the FBC Speed.

2). Notch Filters: Use it to deal with the noise of 6 bands within 20Hz-20KHz frequency range and make recording of related datas and display more intuition and image in the form of graphics and curves.

Clear: Used to initialize all the dynamic and all static filters.

OFF/ON: Used to disable or enable FBC function.

5.10. Auto Mixer configuration interface

The Auto mixer automatically reduces the level of a microphone when it is not being used. Consequently it lowers the rumble, reverberation and other extraneous noise that occur when several microphones operate simultaneously.

It is typically used to mix panel discussions on television talk shows and at conferences and seminars.

It can also be used to mix actors wireless microphones in theater productions and musicals. It is frequently employed in settings where it is expected that a live sound operator will be not present, such as courtrooms and city council chambers.

This function is often used in conjunction with the microphone priority of the Ducker.

1). Local Input: selection of input channels(1-6) to be processed.

2). Network Input: selection of the DANTE32S input channels(1-8) to be processed.

3). Active Time: Set the start mixing time(10ms-6000ms)of the signal of the selected input channel.

4). Auto Mixer OFF/ON: To enable /disable the auto mixing function. Clear All: Used to close all input channels.

5.11. Save/Load/Copy configuration interface



This menu is used to manage the backup parameters. These data can be stored directly in the internal memory of host as a preset. Its memory contains a total of 24 presets.

1.4). After "Emergency Priority" selected, below interface will appear:

a). Priority: User can set the priority from 1 to 16 and the larger number selected means the higher priority set.


